

This book is almost 23 years old. The plays in this book are mostly from the 1970s and early 1980s. What does that mean for you, the actor? That you're going to be doing old-ass monologues that every casting person has heard at least 23948237717220001 times. That's a looooot of Christopher Durang. There's also numerous errors in the index of the book that make finding the monologue you want very difficult. In short -- this book is an antiquated waste, and if you're doing monologues from this book, you're probably in big trouble.
